EDITORIAL



I suppose that I'm just a ridiculously optimistic person. The indications up until Christmas were that we had the makings of a good team, with Europe looking a certainty and an outside chance of being involved in the destiny of the title come next season. However, it now appears that we're back where we started when Joe Royle took over. We're once again looking down the table and setting ourselves minimum points targets to stay up. It's not good enough.

The stadium debate rages on, with the 'Goodison for ever' movement gaining a great deal of support, yet many others expressing the desire to move on. Both sides of the argument are once again represented in this issue's letters' page.

We've had another two of Joe Royle's, now trademark, 'transfer deals', with Schwarzer going to Middlesborough and Bilic staying at West Ham. We do need to get at least two signings in before the deadline I think. There appears to be a distinct lack of creativity in midfield, now that Grant's injured. Barmby is wrongly being employed as an out and out striker instead of an attacking midfielder or in a support man role. We're still crying out for a goalscorer of some pedigree. I think that too much has been expected too soon of Michael Branch. I'm not too impressed with Claus Thomsen, but I'll reserve judgement until he's settled in. Terry Phelan will do a job for us at left back and at least it means that we'll have competition for the position when Hinchcliffe returns. The sale of Anders Limpar by Royle did nothing to endear himself to most of the fans that I've spoken to and I include myself amongst them.

Alternatively, the sale of Andrei has been seen by most Blues as the right thing to do. It was sad to see John Ebbrell go. He was never as good as we thought he was going to be, but he'd have done as a squad player and I'd have certainly had him on my side in a derby game.

Neville's been wrongly blamed for the recent bad run of results when it's obvious that it's the defence that's to blame. I would imagine that this will be his last season with us and I'd like to go on record to say that I think that he's been treated disgracefully by the club. The man is a legend, and was the cornerstone of all our trophy winning sides of the last 16 years. Good luck to you, Neville and a sincere thank you for all that you've done. The fans still appreciate what you've done, even if certain others do not.



THE MEDIAS CRISIS

Do the Everton management think that we are all morons? Do they think that a few optimistic but misleading quotes in the newspapers will gloss over what is happening to Everton F.C.? Peter Johnson believes that ' the fans want to see world class players on a regular basis'. This statement would have you believe that Everton were on a par with the likes of Chelsea and Newcastle. However the truth is Everton no longer have any world class players. Southall and Watson in their prime maybe, and Big D may vet become one with better players around him. Kanchelskis has gone (as forecast in the last issue). There are people who saw him as mercenary and may say I told you so, but I prefer to remember the goals against the shite at Anfield and last seasons' form. His short time at Goodison should have been used to attract other world class players, just as Keegan and Gullit did. However it's now becoming obvious that Joe doesn't seem capable of handling players with flair, i e Samways, Limpar The interest in Kluivert, if we were to believe the papers only materialised to divert attention away from another disastrous run of results, similar to the signing of Barmby in the wake of the last crisis. The dropping of the blameless Southall was obviously intended to take the spotlight off the teams form and direct it towards one man. But Joe was intent that it wasn't going to be him and so he made Southall his scapegoat. I have some sympathy with those who would throw Joe overboard as he's been all at sea for some time now. Some of his after match comments have even surpassed the infamous 'watershed' of last season. Thank goodness that he kept his mouth shut after avoiding the seventh consecutive league defeat, but if you do include the Bradford game it does equal the worst period of any Everton team ever. Blaming the media and critics for Evertons demise reveals a fundamental weakness in Joe's ability to manage a top club. The media don't pick the team or sign the players. When I wrote the article ' An ordinary Joe ' last season, it wasn't well received in some quarters. However, Joe has since gone out of his way to prove my point. "When I was at Oldham, we had ten defeats in a row. " he said prior to the Forest game. Enough said. Joe appears more comfortable with workmanlike players like Parkinson and Barratt. These players have played well for him, but as one wag suggested recently he appears to have transformed the whole team into dogs without any bite.

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
Considering all that has happened at Goodison, I'm amazed when I read other fanzine contributions which are generally supportive of the manager.



His signings have nearly all been failures. Everton's better players, Southall, Watson, Parkinson, Ferguson and the versatile Stuart were all at the club when Royle arrived, but what of the rest? Hottiger and Short have been shown up too often at the back. Barratt has excelled at times but it is an awful indictment of the state of our defence that he's been the form defender this season. The jury is still out on Gerrard and here's hoping that he can eventually be the man to fill Neville's gloves. He was thrown in at a difficult time against Newcastle. Phelan and Thomsen were bought during the injury crisis and both would undoubtedly be good squad players. But I can't help but think that Joe sometimes appears to think that he's still at Boundary Park. Gary Speed is becoming a prolific midfield goalscorer compared to other Everton midfielders in the 1990's, but he does have a tendency to go walkabout too often. Nick Barmby looks a good signing but the team is not playing to his strengths. He has shown a degree of flair and creativity which doesn't bode well for him with Joe in charge. Apart from Barmby, Grant is the only other creative player at the club, and it looks like his season is over. Everyone will have their own opinions about Andrei. I thought of him as a genius when we first signed him and put this season's loss of form down to the manager's lack of motivation and to Andrei's inferior team mates.

Joe can't take all the credit for Duncan being at Goodison as I've said before the fans deserve the most credit. Come to think of it even the big man must be wondering what he's doing in Joe Royle's 1997 version of Everton F C, and his form has not been brilliant.

In finishing I would like to ask the Everton management to invest in the best players possible if they hope to gain respect and support. Don't be put off by failures in the league like Bryan Robson at Middlesborough. At least he tried and failed unlike Royle who is prepared to settle for second best.


REDDERS UPDATE



ONE MORE CHANCE, JOE

As we near the end of another season we can reflect on another most disappointing campaign for Everton F.C. Once again our season ended in January, humiliated by teams from lower divisions

I find it increasingly difficult to defend Joe Royle whom I idolised as a player and admired as a manager. No longer does he do himself justice in front of the camera or in the sports pages. Gone are the slick one liners, replaced by rambling bordering on paranoia.

Besides the agony of managing a struggling club with so much potential and expectation, Joe has also his own personal problems to contend with He revealed on a visit to Northern Ireland before Christmas that he suffers from arthritis. He only disclosed this information when a local arthritis charity box was stolen and he offered to bring Everton over to help replace the lost cash. This is the big hearted guy we grew to love when he saved us from relegation and won Everton the cup, but he has long since lost that image as he desperately tries to lift Everton off the rocks that he has allowed them to drift onto. Due to the injury crisis and our second dreadful run of results Joe cancelled the charity match. (Cynics might say that he didn't want the part timers adding to his misery).

Despite all that has happened over the last two seasons I would ask those who have lost faith in the big man to remember him as he was and with the fans backing he may yet take Everton to the top. What is the alternative ? There are few, if any, young managers with enough experience showing the potential to mange Everton and all the top managers are with successful clubs. Sunderland's Peter Reid would be the obvious choice having worked wonders at Sunderland, but didn't Joe do a similar job at Oldham ? Joe has a unique record at Goodison, taking us full circle in two years. Since he became manager; saving Everton from relegation, then winning the cup and signing Andrei Kanchelskis. He then sold the struggling Russian and once again prevented us from being relegated this season (we hope). Early season title talk and hope of a European place were utter nonsense.

If Joe has learnt anything from this season it is the belated realisation that the team aren't good enough. The vote of confidence from Kenny Dalglish shows how far Everton have sunk. "Everton just need a bit of luck to be up and running again ", he stated. I bet he had a good chuckle after that one. Then Nick Barmby gave Joe his backing. "This changes everything "he claimed after the Forest win. David Unsworth was another upset prior to Everton's 5th consecutive defeat stating " A win would make



everyone instantly happy again ". What a load of nonsense, Dave. Unfortunately Joe has believed these types of statements in the past. That's why when one crisis ceases another is just around the corner. His impact at Everton this season has been as powerful as a wet lettuce falling on a bowl of jelly.

Royle's reluctance to approach Peter Johnson for the £8 million from the Kanchelskis money doesn't bode well for the future. What about the £10-£15 million that was supposed to be available before Andrei was sold? Joe needs to be honest with the fans and admit to his mistakes. Stop making excuses about injuries, big name players not performing (He can't use that one any more now, can he?), and hard luck stories, for Christ's sake stop blaming the media. It's pointless continuing to hope like Mr. Micawber that something will turn up. He needs to make at least two new signings over the summer, a goalscoring striker, the most obvious, a creative midfielder and a couple of reliable defenders. If he continues to underachieve, then I believe that his position would become untenable. Hopefully, Joe can be highly successful in the transfer market and we can look forward to next season with genuine optimism. I'll finish now as my son has just seen a pig land on the roof.

Goodbye Neville and good luck, we'll all miss you.

Anders Limpar joined Everton on the transfer deadline day of 1994 and he was always a player whom I had admired. Having been a boyhood Evertonian just made him easier to love. His career was forever beset by the 'brilliant but inconsistent' tag. I, for one, would have paid to watch the man train. His vision, pace, skill and passing ability was unmatched on his day. He'll always be remembered for the bizarre handball and dive during THE Wimbledon game at the end of the 94/95 season, but that was Anders, never predictable. He tore Spurs apart on cup semi-final day in 1995 and made two breathtaking passes during the first half of the cup final before going off injured. It was interesting to note that he was the last player to go down the tunnel that day. It was a pleasure to watch the man play in a blue shirt and I wish him all the best in whatever he does in the future. Thanks for the memories, Anders.

Everton were going to rule the world again when Andrei Kanchelskis eventually signed for Everton from Manchester United at the start of last season. £5.5 million seemed like a bargain for possibly the best right winger in the world. He may have been a money grabbing mercenary, but he did give us a few good days out, Sheff Wed. away & Blackburn away last season, and of course the never to be forgotten 2-0 victory at the shithole across the park. Don't remember him for the Bradford game, he was a class act and it will be a brave man who tries to fill the No. 17 shirt.

Anyway, Good Luck in London/Hull, James, and just think the next time you go to a match, you might just get to see the kick off.






